Rod Nabholz turned this lidded bowl for his wife, Donna, from Claro Walnut and Hard Maple. Finished with wipe on poly.








Rod Nabholz turned this 10-inch Ash bowl for his Mother-in-Law, Ruth. Finished in WOP.
